




CONCEALED WEAPONS 2nd QUARTER 2002

CONCEALED PERMIT STATISTICS


33.7% of total permits are located in Salt Lake County
13.0% of total permits are located in Utah County
9.5% of total permits are located in Davis County
7.7% of total permits are located in Weber County
22.9% of total permits are located in counties off the Wasatch front
13.6% of total permits are held by non-residents

22 new concealed carry applications were denied during the 2nd quarter of 2002. The applicant has the right to appeal to the Concealed Permit Board which will review the reason the denial was made. Each quarter approximately 20 revocation and denial appeals are reviewed by the Concealed Permit Board. The Board overturns approximately 1% after review.

A permit application may be denied for any of the following reasons:

- 1. Felony conviction
- 2. Convicted of an offense involving the use of Alcohol
- 3. Convicted of a Crime of Violence
- 4. Convicted of any offenses involving Controlled Substance
- 5. Convicted of an offense of Moral Turpitude (Fraud, Theft, Shoplifting, etc.)
- 6. Convicted of an offense involving Domestic Violence
- 7. Has been adjudicated as Mentally Incompetent
 - 8. Is not qualified to purchase and possess a dangerous weapon or handgun pursuant to federal law
 - 9. Cause to believe applicant may be a danger to self or others by evidence including but not restricted to:
 - A. Past pattern of behavior involving unlawful violence or threats of unlawful violence
 - B. Past participation in incidents involving unlawful violence or threats of unlawful violence
 - C. Conviction of any offense in involving weapons violations

When assessing good character the bureau may consider mitigating circumstances. Mitigating circumstances may include length of time since an offense, number of offenses, and type of offenses.



^{*}In February of 2000, BCI implemented a new program to ensure the integrity of the Utah Concealed Carry Permit by checking arrest records on a daily basis, this accounts for the dramatic 241.3% increase seen in 2000.
