



# FIREARM TRANSFERS BY COUNTY

### **SECOND QUARTER 2003**

There were 12,393 requests to purchase weapons during the 2<sup>ND</sup> quarter of 2003. 309 requests were denied. The following tables reflect transfer requests by county, and the reason purchases were denied.





## CONCEALED PERMIT STATISTICS

32.7% of total permits are located in Salt Lake County

12.9% of total permits are located in Utah County

9.4% of total permits are located in Davis County

7.8% of total permits are located in Weber County

22.9% of total permits are located in counties off the Wasatch front


14.9% of total permits are held by non-residents

33 new concealed carry applications were denied during the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2003. The applicant has the right to appeal to the Concealed Permit Board, which will review the reason for denial. Approximately 20 revocation and denial appeals are reviewed by the Concealed Permit Board each quarter, the Board overturns approximately 1% after review.

A permit application may be denied for any of the following reasons:

- 1. Felony conviction
- 2. Convicted of an offense involving the use of Alcohol
- 3. Convicted of a Crime of Violence
- 4. Convicted of any offenses involving Controlled Substance
- 5. Convicted of an offense of Moral Turpitude (Fraud, Theft, Shoplifting, etc.)
- 6. Convicted of an offense involving Domestic Violence
- 7. Has been adjudicated as Mentally Incompetent
- 8. Is not qualified to purchase and possess a dangerous weapon or handgun pursuant to federal law
- 9. Cause to believe applicant may be a danger to self or others by evidence including but not restricted to:
  - A. Past pattern of behavior involving unlawful violence or threats of unlawful violence
  - B. Past participation in incidents involving unlawful violence or threats of unlawful violence
  - C. Conviction of any offense in involving weapons violations
- 10. Not qualified to purchase and possess a dangerous weapon under federal law.

When assessing good character the bureau may consider mitigating circumstances. Mitigating circumstances may include length of time since an offense, number of offenses, and type of offenses.


